What is Easter?

My Dear Parishioners,

We are preparing for **"Easter"** the greatest feast, which reveals the greatest Mystery of Christian life. **What is Easter?** Some might say Easter is the celebration of Christ's triumph over sin and death. For others, Easter signifies a glorious celebration, religious services and feasting. For children especially, Easter means munching into soft marzipan eggs, hot cross buns, or crunching on chocolate bonnets and bunnies.

Easter, as I reflect, is the story of discovering that Christ lives. This fact has taken a deep fear out of life, the fear of death. At the heart of the Easter story, stands the deathless assurance that we do not make our way alone through this world. Christ is not a mere memory, but a presence. And because He lives, we too shall live. In answer to the age-old question "*If a man dies, shall he live again?" Easter declares, 'for as in Adam all die even so in Christ shall all be made alive.*'

Easter is the discovery that Christ not only lives, but He triumphs. It takes out of life not simply the fear of death, but the fear of defeat. If Christianity had ended on the cross, we would never have heard of it. If it offered nothing beyond Calvary, it would be a religion of despair. Easter thus changed martyrdom into a coronation. Easter, in short, is the essence of everything that makes life worth living. By **His** own death, **Christ** changed the very nature of death, made it a passage, a Passover, transforming the tragedy of tragedies into the ultimate victory. Easter is the time to put on the armour of God so that we take a stand against Satan and evil.

At Easter, we have been made conscious of the wonders that God has worked on our behalf, especially the wonder of the resurrection of **Jesus** and the consequent wonder of our redemption. Yes, we are a redeemed people, and now it is our responsibility to look redeemed.

Together with my Co-Pastors Frs. Callisto, Ciril, Sundar and Sunil, I wish all our Parishioners, **A VERY HAPPY EASTER!** May the Risen **JESUS** become even more alive in you, your families and in our Parish!

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EASTER – PROMISE OF NEW LIFE

Easter is celebrated every year between the 21st March and 25th April, on the first Sunday after the full moon in spring. We celebrate this solemn occasion with deep gratitude as it promises us the salvation and new life offered to us through the Life, Passion, Death and Resurrection of our Lord Jesus. Easter promises 'New Life' to each one of us, the super-abundance of life in the Risen Lord as seen in John 10:10 - ".....I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly." The New Life that Jesus promises certainly does not mean an abundance of worldly goods and wealth but an abundance of deep faith and courage to be His witnesses and messengers

St. Augustine in his youth was profligate, leading an immoral life. His saintly mother Monica prayed for him unceasingly, because of which he was converted and is known, as the father and doctor of the Church. One day as he was walking through a place he had frequented in his younger days, a woman recognized him and called out, "Augustine! Augustine!" Augustine ignored the call, making the woman cry out again: "Augustine! Augustine! It is I!" But Augustine continued walking straight ahead saying, "But it is not I." Yes, the old Augustine had now died to sin and the 'chief character' in his life was

now the resurrected Christ, 'the Christ within' in whose name he had been baptized, and given a new beginning. St. Augustine had a deep experience of the Risen Lord just like St. Paul who wrote, "So if anyone is in Christ, there is a new creation: everything old has passed away; see, everything has become new!" (2 Corinthians 5:17)

The celebration of Easter, the resurrection of Christ is about a 'New Beginning' and 'New Life'. In the Easter Vigil liturgy, darkness symbolizes chaos or death and light suggests order and life - both symbols of 'a beginning'. New Christians are baptized during the Easter Vigil. We too renew our baptismal promises as a sign of this new beginning, leaving behind the messiness of the past and moving forward with great faith and hope. We let the light of Christ radiate our hearts and bring new life to us for all eternity. The readings too emphasize new beginnings: Genesis narrates the beginning of a new universe; Exodus speaks of the Israelites crossing the Red Sea from slavery to freedom, a new future. St. Paul describes the power of the Good News to create us anew, urging us to lead morally and spiritually new lives. Finally, the gospel presents the Good News of the new beginning of Jesus; His glorious resurrection.

The Paschal mystery has two aspects: by His death, Christ

liberates us from sin; by His Resurrection, He opens for us the way to a new life. This new life is above all justification that reinstates us in God's grace, "so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life." Justification consists in both victory over the death caused by sin and a new participation in grace.

> - Catechism of the Catholic Church, Paragraph 654

Good Friday was a day of victory for the Jewish authorities because they had crucified Jesus. But for the followers of Jesus, it's a significant day that gifted new life. What is this new life which Jesus' resurrection brings us? The public ministry of Jesus involved teaching, preaching and healing. He chose the twelve apostles to be with Him, to know and experience Him and then go out and proclaim the Good News. Their understanding of Jesus was that He was the expected Messiah, the Savior of all. They expected Him to be the most powerful king who would liberate the people from slavery and establish a new kingdom. They did not understand Jesus as the suffering messiah who would be put to death. They were devastated at the dreadful and humiliating death of Jesus on the cross. Everything seemed hopeless and meaningless. They lost their leader, their teacher, and their friend. They lost their sense of purpose, the purpose for having given up their jobs, family and homes. They lost the hope that He represented, hope for a better world.

We too have lost much in the past one year. The Covid-19 pandemic has been devastating: some have lost their loved ones, many have lost jobs, we have all lost the freedom to move freely and gather with family and friends. The promise of Easter is about turning what was lost into a new life. At this juncture, Easter reminds us that JESUS IS RISEN, victorious over death, with a promise of new life. Surely, we will come out of this crisis with a stronger perception of the bonds between us, with family, neighbour and even strangers. Our losses can be transformed into a deeper appreciation of the "essential" things in our lives and our world, acknowledging the people we probably have neglected viz., food-suppliers, healthcare providers or our children's teachers. This can perhaps lead us to a deeper joy for the new life that awaits us beyond the present grief.

Easter transforms death in all its forms into a new life. Every time we suffer defeat, failure or are plagued by a crippling disease, we experience a bit of death. When we are overwhelmed by problems, discouraged by disappointments, we are diminished in some way. But belief in the Risen Christ will enable us to discover new dreams to pursue, new challenges to take up and new reasons to try again, making the impossible possible and the unreachable reachable. We encounter marvelous people who choose to live the way of Jesus standing up for justice, caring for the oppressed, working for peace, consoling the lonely, soothing the weary, and unceasingly seeking new ways to serve. They are simple people: parents, teenagers, students, young, old, religious, you and me. We all testify to the power of the Resurrection among us when we refuse to let evil and death overpower us but let the way of Jesus triumph in our lives through our faith, hope and love. By raising Jesus from the dead, God confirms the way of Jesus as the Way of Life for us. Jesus loved the poor and the weak; cleansed the lepers, and helped the needy. He promoted life always and cured the sick even on the Sabbath day. Jesus restored human beings to their true human dignity displacing blind ritualistic practices. Consequently, He faced opposition from the religious authorities who eventually put Him to death. Easter offers all believers the hope of a new life here and now. Yes, we will all rise from the dead and share in the eternal glory.

So, what must we do? Mary Magdalene having experienced the Risen Lord announced the good news to the frightened Apostles. Similarly, the Apostles after encountering the Risen Lord were transformed into a brigade of daring missionaries. Jesus, who was taken away from them, causing them immense pain and sorrow, was now transformed into a living presence that would inspire and guide them in the future. Their loss became their triumph. They preached the Good News of Christ's resurrection everywhere and witnessed the resurrection power of Easter.

Let's therefore join St. Paul as he guides us: So if you have been raised with Christ, seek the things that are above, where Christ is, seated at the right hand of God. Set your minds on things that are above, not on things that are on earth, for you have died, and your life is hidden with Christ in God. When Christ who is your life is revealed, then you also will be revealed with Him in glory. (Colossians 3:1-4). Let's all live with Hope and Joy.

CCO ON THE MOVE

The Resurrection of Christ is also our resurrection. Easter is to love when our love is rejected, to hope against all hope and failure, to forgive even when we are not forgiven. In other words, Christ's resurrection should bring about a total transformation in our vision, attitude and world-view of every Christian. Easter should enable us all, to see creation through the eyes of hope and divine love, just as Jesus would want us to do.

The Community Welfare Fund Committee in co-ordination with the Centre for Community Organization (CCO) helps the needy and marginalized of our parish who require funds for their educational, medical and housing needs. Details of help rendered for the period April 2020 to February 2021 is: Education – 37 cases, Medical – 34 cases and Housing – 27 cases. Total - 98 cases.

The CCO continues to help those who are seeking jobs as house-helps and patient attendants. Many who needed jobs as housemaids were successfully placed in employment.

The **St. Vincent de Paul Association (SVP)** continues to help the adopted families of our parish and also helps people belonging to other faiths.

On the occasion of World Couple's Day, the Family Cell and Missionary Families for Christ (formerly CFC), organized a Special Eucharistic celebration for the couples of our parish on February 14th, 2021 in the Community Centre with the renewal of Marriage Vows and a special blessing for the well-being of couples. Also, to mark this special day, the Family Cell had a fun contest for all the married couples, young and old, titled the **Marriage Proposal** Contest by capturing their special moments in a MP4AV and win many exciting prizes. Eight couples participated in this contest. After Mass, a special get together was organized to announce the winning videos.

Sunday School Pastoral Team: To usher in the Christmas spirit and to showcase the hidden talents of our children, from classes I to IX, the Sunday School Pastoral Team organized a talent contest where the children could exhibit their skills in drawing, poetry recitation, photography and creating meaningful objects in the 'best out of waste' category. This ushered in the badly needed Christmas spirit and the children were enthused to participate. This academic year we had 44 children receive their First Holy Communion on 6th February 2021 and 61 youth received the Sacrament of Confirmation, on 28th February 2021.

Small Christian Communities: An Input Session by His Lordship, Bishop Barthol via Google Meet was held on 10th December 2020. The topic "NO ONE IN WANT" was very enriching and a learning curve. Later on 7th March there was an input session for the animators by His Lordship, Bishop Barthol on the topic "PASSING ON THE BATON".



Since January 2021, the **Dental Clinic** has reopened and is functioning smoothly. The working hours are from 1.00 pm to 4.00 pm

INSPIRATION FROM SAINTS

St. Maria Faustina Kowalska of the Blessed Sacrament

Feast day: October 05 Patron Saint of Divine Mercy

Saint Maria Faustina Kowalska, known as the "Apostle of the Divine Mercy," is one of the outstanding mystics of the Church. She was the third of ten children born on

August 25, 1905 to Stanislaus Kowalska and Marianna Babel of Glogowiec, a village in the heart of Poland. Her baptismal name was 'Helena'. Helena was considered 'a blessed child' who sanctified her mother's womb because she was born after 9 years of childlessness and two complicated pregnancies.

Helena's whole life was characterized by the virtues of the love of God, obedience and diligence, taught by her poor, uneducated but upright parents.

At an early age, just five, Helena was drawn to commune with heaven. She first felt a calling to the religious life when she was just seven years old. Her schooling lasted only three terms, due to the Russian occupation of Poland. Helena wanted to immediately join a convent. However, her parents refused. At age 16, Helena became a housekeeper to help her parents and support herself.

In 1924, Helena experienced her first vision of Jesus. While at a dance with her sister, she saw a suffering Jesus who reproached her, "How long will you keep putting Me off?" She hurriedly slipped out of the dance hall to go to a Cathedral, where Jesus instructed her to leave for Warsaw immediately and join a convent. She left with the only set of clothes that she was wearing and departed not having any clarity of her future. In her dejection she prayed to the Mother of God who led her to Warsaw. In Warsaw, Helena approached many different convents, but was turned away every time. She was judged on her appearances and sometimes rejected for poverty.



Finally, the Mother Superior for the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy decided to take in Helena on the condition that she would pay for her own religious habit. Working as a housekeeper, Helena began to save her money and make deposits to the Convent.

On April 30, 1926, at age 20, she finally received her habit and took the religious name of Sr. Maria Faustina of the Blessed Sacrament and in 1928 she took her first religious vows as a nun. In May 1930 she arrived in Plock, Poland. Soon after, she began to show the first signs of her illness and was sent away to rest. Several months later, Sr. Faustina returned to the convent.

On February 22, 1931, Sr. Faustina was visited by Jesus, who presented Himself as the "King of Divine Mercy" wearing a white garment with red and pale rays emanating from His heart. The Lord Jesus, when asked, explained: "The pale ray stands for the Water which makes souls righteous. The red ray stands for the Blood which is the life of souls. Happy is the one who will dwell in their shelter". Jesus told her to paint an image of that vision with the inscription: "Jesus, I trust in You."" Jesus wanted the image to be solemnly blessed on the first Sunday after Easter; that Sunday is to be the Feast of Mercy"

Sr. Faustina accepted Jesus' invitation to become His apostle and secretary, and to announce anew to mankind the Gospel messages of God's mercy for the world. In her Diary, Sr. Faustina narrates how that evening her soul was overwhelmed with fear, but also with great joy.

Sr. Faustina, not knowing how to paint, asked around her Plock convent for help but was denied. It wasn't until three years later, in 1934, that the first painting of the image was created.

In 1932, Sr. Faustina returned to Warsaw. After taking her final vows On May 1, 1933, Sr. Faustina became a perpetual sister of Our Lady of Mercy and was transferred to Vilnius, where she met Blessed Fr. Michael Sopocko, the appointed confessor to the nuns. During her first confession with Fr. Sopocko, Sr. Faustina told him about her conversations with Jesus and His plan for her. Fr. Sopocko insisted she be evaluated by a psychiatrist. Faustina passed all the required tests and was determined sane, leading Fr. Sopocko to support her religious efforts. Fr. Sopocko not having time to listen to her lengthy confessions encouraged her to start keeping a Diary and to record all of her conversations with Jesus. It was Fr. Sopocko who introduced her to Kazimierowski, the artist of the first Divine Mercy painting.

According to Faustina's Diary, on Good Friday, 1935, Jesus told her he wanted the Divine Mercy image publically honored. In September 1935, Faustina wrote about her vision of the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, used to obtain mercy, trust in Christ's mercy and to show mercy to others. Sr. Faustina once attempted to set up a new congregation for Divine Mercy, but was reminded that she was perpetually vowed to her current order and sent back to Warsaw. In 1936, Sr. Faustina fell ill again. She moved to the sanatorium in Pradnik, Krakow and continued to spend most of her convalescing time in prayer.

In July 1937, the first holy cards with the Divine Mercy image were created and Faustina provided instructions for the Novena of Divine Mercy, as per a message from Jesus. For the rest of 1937, the Divine Mercy image continued to be promoted and grow in popularity.

By the end of 1937, there was a sharp deterioration in Sr. Faustina's health. The visions intensified and it was said that she was looking forward to dying. On October 5, 1938, Faustina died of Multiple Tuberculosis.

She performed ordinary chores – those of a cook, baker, gardener and gatekeeper in the convent. Like other mystics, Sr. Faustina passed through the classical dark night of the spirit. Her entire life, in imitation of Christ's, was to be a sacrifice - a life lived for others. At the Divine Lord's request, she willingly offered her personal sufferings in union with Him to atone for the sins of others. In her daily life she was to become a doer of mercy, bringing joy and peace to others, and by writing about God's mercy, she was to encourage others to trust in Him and thus prepare the world for His second again. As prophesized by Sr.Faustina, the devotion to the Divine Mercy, was banned for two decades.

The Lord endowed her with great graces – with the gift of contemplation, a deep knowledge of the mystery of the mercy of God, visions, revelations, the hidden stigmata, gift of prophecy and of reading into human souls, and also with the rare gift of mystical espousals unknown even to her closest companions.

Her special devotion to Mary Immaculate and to the sacraments of Eucharist and Reconciliation gave her the strength to bear all her sufferings as an offering to God on behalf of the Church and those in special need, especially great sinners and the dying.

The message of mercy that Sister Faustina received is now being spread throughout the world; her Diary, Divine Mercy in my Soul, has become the handbook for devotion to the Divine Mercy.

St. Faustina Kowalska was beatified on April 18, 1993 and canonized on April 30, 2000, both by Pope St. John Paul II. She is the patron saint of Mercy.

Passing On The Baton – Visionary Leadership

We were thrilled to be informed that His Lordship, Bishop Barthol Barretto was visiting our Parish on 7th March 2021, to celebrate Holy Mass and conduct a Training Program for our Animators. The excitement was infectious!

The morning commenced with the celebration of the Eucharist at 9:00 am. In his homily, Bishop Barthol dwelt on the importance and blessedness of the Ten Commandments, which many of us have forgotten. The commandments, he said, do not restrict our freedom but makes us aware of the duties and privileges available to us. The commandments help us build a perfect relationship with God and one another. He touched upon the fact that our bodies being the temple of the Holy Spirit are sacred and keeping that in mind, is how we must live our lives.

"Passing on the Baton", the topic of our Training Session, made us introspect "Am I a good leader? Am I ready to step down at the end of my term? Can I pass on the baton of leadership gracefully and with humility?"

Who better to conduct this Session, for us than Bishop Barthol? We often complain that we cannot find competent people to lead the Communities, Cells and Associations. From the sharing, it became evident, that our insecurities, egoistic attitude, self-centeredness, our feeling of indispensableness and the importance of position and power, are the reasons we do not want to step down and handover our responsibilities.

Jesus, Son of God gave up power, came down into this world and became a servant, came not to be served but to serve. Isn't this the best example of passing on the baton? Look at nature. The sun rises every morning and has to set every evening. Flowers bloom and ultimately die to allow the nurturing of fruits. Only after we die can we resurrect. The moral duty of a good leader is to step down, hand over the reins to the next person and make way for new leadership.

The benefits of stepping down are multifold. It gives you a chance to grow, to learn and seize the opportunity to do new things. With new leadership, there are new ideas, a positive shift in ideology, a different direction and a fresh infusion of energy.

As a rule, every six years the SCC Coordinators must step down and hand over the baton to a successor. For a smooth transition, it is recommended, that at the end of the 4th year, a fitting successor must be chosen and groomed. Training, guiding and accompanying the new leader, will help for a smooth transition.

We thank our Clergy Team for their continuous support and the Parish SCC Coordinators, Candida Mendoza and Jessie Serrao, for organizing this apt Input Session.

In April 2022, many of us would be completing our term as Parish Pastoral Councilors / SCC Coordinators. Will we be ready to step aside and make way for new leadership? Now is the right time, to start scouting for New Leaders in our respective Communities.



A big thank you to the animators for making this possible for us, a memory I will always cherish.



Bounce Back With Proper Protection Protocols

As I write this article, we are coming close to completing one year of COVID 19! It was on 24th March 2020, that our Prime Minister announced a complete lockdown of our country to help save and protect precious human lives due to COVID 19 pandemic hitting the world.

This is not a new phenomenon. In the past, similar world pandemics have occurred and there were lessons to be learnt from past experiences. Almost 102 years ago, in 1918 to be precise, the world had experienced a much more fatal and disastrous **Spanish Flu** Pandemic, which happened after World War I, 1914 - 1918. In that pandemic, almost half of Bombay's (now referred to as Mumbai) population was wiped out.

Since the National lockdown was announced on 24th March 2020, all health authorities and government officials had a very challenging job in hand, trying to save a population of 2 crores + in Mumbai city alone, and 130 crores human lives across India.

Also, the more developed countries like the USA, Canada, Europe and Italy had seen more deaths and fatalities, as compared to India.

But by Divine intervention, India had seen far lesser deaths and fatalities, although our country had seen more than one crore Covid 19 infected people. One of the reasons for our country to emerge successful in fighting the virus was the very timely imposition of a strict and prolonged lockdown. The numbers of those infected with the virus were closely monitored and the lockdown periods were either relaxed or imposed accordingly. Wearing a face mask was made mandatory and a punishable offence otherwise. Maintaining a safe distance of 6 feet between two persons, regular sanitization etc., were some of the other precautionary steps taken to stop the rapid spread of the virus. There were strict curbs on the numbers of people meeting at one place. Major means of transportation like roadways, trains and air travel even International, came to a grinding halt or were allowed restricted movements.

Working from home became the new normal. Online / virtual classroom for school and college children was found to be a safer option, to prevent transmission of Covid virus infection, through asymptomatic carriers in public places. Also regular and mass testing for RT-PCR for early detection of Covid 19 positive cases and strict isolation/quarantine for 14 days reduced the spread of the coronavirus to a great extent.

Being stuck at home in isolation, for a prolonged period, especially for the elderly and children forcibly kept away from school/college classrooms and friends, contributed to building up a lot of fear, panic, anxiety, restlessness and various psychosomatic disorders. Regular online counselling sessions were held for all these mentally affected individuals.

At the end of almost a year, we have some positive news coming in. A preventive Covid vaccine, called **'Covishield'** (manufactured by Serum Institute of India, a Pune based company), has been made available for all Indian citizens. The first to be vaccinated were the Covid Healthcare Workers (Doctors / nurses / para-medical staff / public servants / BMC staff / police personnel). Also included in the initial batch were senior citizens above 60 years and citizens between the ages of 45 to 60 with co-morbid conditions like diabetes / obesity / hypertension / heart disease / cancer / HIV etc.

Parishioners should identify citizens above 60 years (following all safety precautions, drug allergy tests etc., get a go-ahead from their family physician) to get them all vaccinated at Covid Vaccination Centres. We are also blessed to have Holy Spirit Hospital (a Government recognized private Vaccination Centre) nearby. Each dose of the Covid vaccine cost Rs.250/-, at government-recognized private centres. It takes approximate 45 minutes to complete the entire procedure of registration and vaccination as compared to the government-affiliated free Centres, where due to large crowds more than 4 to 5 hours are lost. The whole procedure needs to be repeated after a gap of 28 days when the second dose is due.

Two doses of the Covishield Vaccine, is comparably a safer vaccine, as it is prepared from a dead Covid virus. It will be adequate and sufficient to fight against prevention and protection from Covid 19 infection. However, we must avoid moving in public areas and continue to maintain the current protocols of wearing a face mask or double mask which is recommended while moving in more crowded areas of Mumbai and elsewhere in our country. Maintain safe distancing and sanitizing at all times. If all these guidelines are strictly adhered to even after receiving the 2 doses of Covishield vaccine, it will go a long way to stop and prevent the further spread of Covid 19 and thereby eliminate slowly but surely, the Covid 19 virus from the face of the earth!
