Heart of Jesus – An Invitation to Love Like Jesus

Of the many symbols depicting love, the heart is almost universally accepted and recognized across all cultures and traditions as the ultimate symbol of love. As we celebrate the Feast of our loving and vibrant Parish named, after the Sacred Heart of Jesus, we are invited to love like Jesus.

St. John in Chapter 5: 9-17 elaborates on the theme of unity with God and making our lives fruitful like the vine and the branches. In James 2:26 we read, *"For as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is dead also." Inspired by these words and sentiments, the Parish theme for the Year 2023 is "Faith & Works".*

Jesus gives us a commandment of love. He points to Himself as a Role Model of true love. 'Love one another as I have loved you'. If we say we believe in God but do not have love in our hearts for our brothers and sisters, we are lying and God's love and grace are not in us. Love has to be revealed, seen and felt, and this happens when we let His love transform us and make us more compassionate, kind and loving. Love is seen in our loving actions, the proof of our faith and love of God.

Paulo Coelho, a Brazilian author in his thoughts and reflections, 'Like a Flowing River' tells of a Japanese legend about how a certain monk, filled with enthusiasm for the beauty of the Chinese book, '*Tao te* *Ching'*, decided to raise enough money to translate and publish it in his own language. This took him ten years. Meanwhile, the country was devastated by a terrible plague, and the monk decided to use the money he had collected to relieve the suffering of those who were ill. However, as soon as the situation stabilized, he again set about collecting the money he needed to translate and publish the Tao. Another ten years passed, and he was about to publish the book when a tidal wave left hundreds of people homeless. The monk again spent the money he had collected, this time on rebuilding homes. Another ten years passed; he collected more money to publish the book and, finally, the Japanese were able to read *Tao te Ching*.

The wise say that, in fact, this monk published three editions of the Tao: two invisible and one in print. Sometimes the invisible books, born out of our generosity towards other people, are as important as those that fill our libraries.

Charity and generosity are not merely doing good works, but they are primarily an inner expansion of the heart, accepting others, without condemning and judging them, and not even analysing them. We tend to be comfortable and easily get along with persons who act and think like us. The challenge is to exercise charity and generosity towards those who act and think differently from us. Charity and generosity are primarily a struggle to love and accept the other as he or she is. A generous heart, kind speech, a warm smile and a life of service and compassion are what ultimately renew and revitalize humanity.

Forgiveness may not erase the past, but it certainly enlarges the future. To those who have wronged us, we grant forgiveness; to those we have wronged, we ask forgiveness; to those we have helped, we wish we could have done a little more; to those we were unable to help, we ask understanding; to those who helped us, we are eternally grateful.

And so, in this **Year of Faith & Works - 2023** let us cheerfully respond to the invitation to **love like Jesus!** If we knew that today was our last day, what would we do differently? Often, being kind is more important than being right. Let us live therefore gratefully! Love generously! Care deeply! Speak kindly! Act large-heartedly! ... Leave the rest to God!!!

CCO on the Move

Parish Pastoral Council (PPC)

Elections for the induction of new PPC members for the academic years 2023–2026 were held in January 2023 as the present three-year term of the PPC members concluded on 31st May 2023. The newly elected PPC members, with the assistance of the SCC Coordinators and Animators, will serve their respective Communities to carry out various activities and events.

Parish Associations and Cells

Elections for Heads of Cells and Associations for the three-year term 2023-2026, were held in January 2023 in the respective Associations/ Cells. In a vote held on March 19, 2023, six candidates from the Parish Association Council (PAC) were elected to the PPC for the years 2023–2026.

The Parish Youth Council (PYC) organized the Way of the Cross on Good Friday. This was a live enactment of the Stations around the Church and Gyan Ashram campus with the parishioners following in procession.

The Youth of our parish (PYC) along with the PYAT members organized a summer camp for all the children from Std. I to Std. VIII from 1st May to 7th May. It was well organized, with good attendance and the children enjoyed it to their heart's content.

The Divine Mercy Cell conducted the Station of the Cross at Atma Darshan campus on 26th March 2023. They conducted the Divine Mercy Novenas from Good Friday which culminated on Divine Mercy Sunday with a Feast Mass at 10:00 am. After Mass, a short program was organized.

The Senior Citizen Cell organized the Station of the Cross at the Don Bosco property in Karjat on 23rd March 2023. It was well organized and there was a good response. All those who attended had a wonderful experience. They also conducted the Way of the Cross on Good Friday in the Church. **The Bible Cell**, as part of the 'Year of Faith and Works' observed by our Parish, conducted the following activities:

- I. 3rd March Stations of the Cross
- II. 11th March Visit to Shantidaan, an Institution for the differently abled
- III.March 25th-26th Gethsemane a Night of Mercy, conducted along with 'Jesus the Real Vine' our parish prayer group. Over 400 people attended this Lenten Night Vigil which included sessions on repentance and forgiveness, inner healing and infilling followed by Eucharist.
- IV. March 25th and April 22nd Saturday morning Adorations. Nearly 100 individuals attended the time of praise and worship, Word of God and intercessory prayers.

The Women's Cell celebrated Women's Day On 5th March with Holy Eucharist at 5.30 pm followed by a short talk on 'Breaking Barriers' and a lucky draw.

St. Vincent De Paul Association (SVP)

In February and March 2023, the SVP provided ration, medical and cash assistance to the adopted families of our Parish and the needy, belonging to other faiths. During Lent, the Station of the Cross was conducted in Atma Darshan for the SVP. members along with the adopted families.

A Warm Welcome Dear Fathers



Fr. John Mascarenhas SVD

A Hearty welcome to Fr. John Mascarenhas SVD our new Parish Priest. For the majority of Sacred Heart Parishioners, Fr. John, fondly called 'Masky' is a familiar face. He has served in our Parish as co-pastor on two previous occasions from October 1996 to October 2000 and from June 2015 to June 2016.

Fr. John hails from Vasco da Gama, Goa. He was born on 11th January 1966 to the late Andrew Francis and late Claudina Mascarenhas. He is the sixth among his siblings of six brothers and two sisters. Fr. John joined the SVD Seminary after completing High School in 1982. For his Overseas Training Programme, Fr. John was sent to Brazil for two years and has completed his

diaconate in the Divine Word Seminary, Pune. He was ordained a priest on 14th May 1996. His pastoral motto is 'To gather unto Him'

His first assignment as a priest was as Vocation Promoter at St. Francis Xavier Church, Goa for five months after which he was appointed as co-pastor at our Parish in October 1996. Soon after the inauguration of our Church in October 2000, Fr. John was transferred to St. Francis Xavier Church, Giriz, Vasai in order to learn Marathi.

In June 2001, the local bishop appointed Fr John as co-pastor at Mother of God Church, Palli, Naigaon West. Here, he assisted the Parish Priest in catering to the needs of the Englishspeaking Community. It was during this time that he completed his B.Ed.

In June 2004, he was appointed as co-pastor at St. Theresa's Church, Bandra. Initially, he worked as a teacher in the Secondary Section of the school and was eventually promoted as the Head-Master of the Primary Section and Vice-Principal of the Secondary Section. In June 2009, Fr. John was appointed as the Principal of the School and for the next 11 years Fr. John continued in this capacity and had also been assisting the Parish.

In June 2015, Fr. John SVD joined for a second tenure in our Parish as co-pastor and also as Manager of St. Arnold's School. He left our Parish in 2016 to undertake an important assignment, as Rector of St. Francis Xavier Seminary, the SVD Seminary and as Director of Ashirwad in Raia, Goa. Later, in 2017 he also became Prefect while continuing as Rector.

In 2018, Fr. John was assigned as Assistant Parish Priest at Holy Family Church, Marcela, Goa and he took over as Parish Priest in 2020. Fr. John is appointed as Parish Priest at Sacred Heart Church effective June 2023.

Fr. John is a people's Pastor who is always available for the sheep of his flock. He is well known for his melodious singing and friendly presence. His cheerful disposition always brings a smile to those around him. His work with the Youth of our Parish is well remembered.

Fr. Edwin Vas SVD

Fr. Michael Francis Edwin Vas, SVD was born on 29th September 1955 to Late Ambrose Vas and Carmine Vas of St. Roque's Parish, Neerude, Diocese of Mangalore. He is the 8th among their nine children. He has 3 brothers and 5 sisters, one of whom is a religious nun in the Bethany Congregation. Fr. Edwin Joined the SVD Seminary on 30th May 1968. He studied at St. Philomena's College, Mysore and graduated in Arts from the University of Mysore. He further did his BA in Philosophy and BA in Theology from Jnana Deepa Vidyapeeth, Pune. His Seminary formation was at Divine Word Seminary, Pune. In 1990, Fr. Edwin pursued his Masters in Mass Communications from Leicester University, UK and also obtained a Post Graduate Diploma in Christian Communication from Cairos, Maynooth, Ireland in 1991.

He was ordained priest on 10th May 1984 by Rt. Rev. Bp. Basil D'Souza, Bishop of Mangalore at Our Lady of Remedies Church, Kirem.

Fr. Edwin served as an assistant at Catholic Centre, Sangareddy, Medak District, Andhra Pradesh from June 1984 - May 1985, and as a co-pastor at Holy Spirit Church, Velvarthy Nalgonda Diocese, Andhra Pradesh from June 1985 – June 1986, He was appointed Procurator at Gyan Ashram, Andheri, Mumbai from June 1986 – May 1988.

Fr. Edwin has a rich experience in the field of Communication having worked as a Sound Engineer for 30 years at Ishvani Kendra, Pune, in three separate tenures: from June 1988 to May 1989, as Assistant Director from June 1991 to May 2009 and from June 2011 to May 2023. He was the Head of the Communication Department and Asst. Director/Superior in his last assignment prior to his appointment at our Parish.

He has worked as a Camera Person, Editor and Director and has produced 4 Video Music Albums, for Ishvani Kendra. He has also edited and directed 3 Video Albums, for other Christian Religious Centers. He has made more than 25 documentaries and prayer videos.

He had been conducting regular classes on Media Education, Sound Recording and Film Making (Video production) at Ishvani Kendra and other Communication Centers in India.

Fr. Edwin has also served on the Communications team at the Divine Call Centre, Mulki from June 2009 to May 2010 and as a Spiritual Director at Vidya Niketan - SVD Seminary, Mysore from June 2010 to May 2011.

His Pastoral motto is "By this everyone will know that you are My disciples if you love one another" (John 13:35).

To Serve With Love



'Pastores Dabo Vobis', an apostolic exhortation by Pope John Paul says "The priest is a living and transparent image of Christ the Priest". A priest, therefore bears the responsibility to become like Christ. To do so, he must learn to love as He loves and render Christ-like service out of pure love for our Heavenly Father and His children.

The Priestly Motto of **Fr. Innocent Fernandes SVD**, *"To serve with Love"*, embodies the core principles of Jesus. It captures the essence of Fr. Innocent's vocation and his mission as a priest to love and serve others with compassion and to be available to them.

EARLY DAYS & VOCATION TO PRIESTHOOD

Fr. Innocent was born on 28th December, the feast of 'The Holy Innocents'. He is a native of Goa, belonging to St. Ann's Parish in Agonda, Cancona where his family owned paddy fields and engaged in farming.

Fr. Innocent began his schooling in a Portuguese school but in 1961 he had to move to 'shala'- a Marathi school when the Portuguese retreated from Goa. Later he was admitted to the English medium St. Anne's Parish School which involved a daily 45-minute walk and crossing a river by boat to get to school.

When he was in the seventh grade, Fr. Innocent, who cherished the desire to be a priest, was

directed to the SVD Minor Seminary by his cousin Fr. Diago Fernandes, a diocesan priest. Here he trained for the priestly ministry and also enjoyed farm work and playing sports, especially football. He also had a wonderful ear for music and sought to pick up some musicoriented hobbies, which he pursued during his time in the seminary.

Today, reflecting on his many years of varied pastoral experiences in mission stations, Parishes and also at the SVD Seminaries, Fr. Innocent acknowledges that a number of circumstances had an impact on his becoming a priest and his vocation as an SVD. First and foremost, his family, especially his mother played a significant role in nurturing his faith and instilling in him the values of service, compassion and devotion. She was a diligent worker by nature and an example for all of her children.

His interactions with priests during his formative years, as well as their guidance, and encouragement enabled him to move forward with his choice, and of becoming a priest.

ON HIS APPOINTMENT TO THE SACRED HEART PARISH FOR A THIRD TIME

Fr. Innocent was ordained on May 12, 1988, and has been a priest for 35 years. A major portion of his priesthood – about 19 years – he has served at Sacred Heart Parish over three different tenures: 1993–1997, 2002–2005, and the most recent one, from 2011–2023.

Fr. Innocent states that the experience during each of his terms in Sacred Heart Parish has been unique. He summarizes each term in a word:

The first term here in our parish was about learning; the second term was about practising; and the third term was about delivering.

Having been in this parish on two prior

occasions, he was surprised on being appointed for the third time. However, he had no reservations absolutely. For him, it was simply a homecoming with an open heart and a willingness to serve.

EXPERIENCES IN OUR PARISH

Fr. Innocent affirms having had the opportunity and good fortune of meeting, encountering and interacting with diverse people in this Parish. Some very pleasant, some helpful, some very supportive, some very committed and dedicated, some friendly, some very caring and loving and generous, some indifferent, some very critical and judgmental, some very understanding. On the whole, Sacred Heart Parish has been very supportive, loving, and caring. His experience at Sacred Heart was truly wonderful and very enriching. He felt like a shepherd surrounded by all his sheep around him. He says 'It is a wonderful feeling to see the collaboration between the clergy and the laity, the people's dedication and their selfless service'.

Highlighting his unique experience during the pandemic, when the physical gathering was restricted, like every head of the family, Fr. Innocent too experienced fear and anxiety for his Parishioners. Not able to do much, he along with the clergy team interceded and prayed for the good health and safety of parishioners.

Very quickly they adapted to the digital media platform to continue providing spiritual nourishment to the faithful and this fostered a sense of unity and allowed them to remain connected as a Community. 'My joys knew no bounds.' - Fr. Innocent states reminiscing of the time when restrictions were eased and all were able once again to gather for the Holy Sacraments.

He admits that all of his experiences here and especially during the pandemic have enabled him to understand life better, respond to situations appropriately and grow as a person and most importantly made him humble and available.

OVERCOMING CHALLENGES MAKES LIFE MEANINGFUL

Fr. Innocent considers the COVID-19 Pandemic a great challenge during his recent tenure in the Parish which brought in its wake many difficulties, restrictions and economic constraints to many families.

The second challenge Fr. Innocent considers, 'was of not being a good preacher'. However, he cheerfully continues, 'But what made me happy was the people's understanding and acceptance of my language of love.'

Sacred Heart has been a tremendous blessing, the vibrant and active Community has provided a fertile ground for spiritual growth and meaningful interaction; especially at the time of the pandemic. The support and co-operation of the Parishioners and the staff and the employees have helped him face the challenges successfully and serve the Community with love and dedication. Fr. Innocent expresses his gratitude and sincere appreciation to all the parishioners who give of their time, talents, and resources to the development and well-being of the Sacred Heart Parish.

MEMORABLE INCIDENT DURING THE PASTORAL MINISTRY

Carrying a load of fond memories to cherish, Fr. Innocent was reluctant to single out any specific memorable event. He acknowledges that his interactions with his Parishioners on various occasions always made him feel blessed.

DAILY MOTIVATION TO KEEP UP WITH THE ASSIGNMENT AT THE VIBRANT SACRED HEART PARISH

Fr. Innocent admits, firstly, being faithful to God in prayer helped him to keep up with the day-to-day challenges of serving this fastpaced Parish.

'The wholehearted co-operation and support of each and every Parishioner, those who worked actively and those who worked silently behind the scenes, supporting and contributing their time, talents and resources to the various ministries and initiatives of the Parish'. is what kept Fr. Innocent working and motivated. The generosity and willingness of the Parishioners to share their blessings with others has been instrumental in nurturing the spirit of the Community and has touched many lives, including mine" says Fr. Innocent

Besides that, being a witness to the Parishioner's commitment to their faith also became a source of motivation for him.

The Lord is My Shepherd



The theme of Fr. Ciril Dsouza SVD's priestly motto, 'The Lord is my Shepherd' is the opening verse of Psalm 23. It is a reminder of all his profound life experiences of Jesus as our Divine Shepherd not only leading us to verdant pastures but also guarding and protecting us. Our Shepherd walks ahead of the sheep, ready to confront the dangers ahead. He loves His sheep and is willing to lay down His life for them and leads them by example.

This image was formed and developed from Fr. Ciril's personal experiences of God protecting him when as a young boy from a peasant family, he would accompany cows and buffalos to the hillside for grazing and bring them back home safely. Fr. Ciril responded to the Divine Shepherd's irresistible call to join the priesthood and right from the time he joined the Seminary, he experienced God's love, care and protection more tangibly and mightily; even amidst the pangs of death.

As Fr. Ciril leaves our Parish to take up his new assignment, he shares with us the significant events in his life and priestly vocation. He says that he has given his best to God and the people and in turn, God has blessed him with beautiful experiences of His love and care through the people of Sacred Heart Parish.

EARLY DAYS & VOCATION TO PRIESTHOOD

Fr. Ciril hails from St. John Bosco Parish of the Udupi Diocese, Mangalore, which is known for the many vocations that have emerged there. He is the youngest of seven siblings.

Living in a joint agricultural family, every member was expected to work in the fields. Fr. Ciril too had to labour hard in the fields, and his studies were consequently neglected. At the time of his SSC examinations, Fr. Ciril, who was an average student struggled with his studies and pledged to God that if he passed Std. X, he would join the seminary.

He was also inspired by the priests of his Parish who came home during the vacation. Young Ciril was mesmerized at the sight of them concelebrating the Eucharist; they appeared splendid and graceful and he unconsciously began to harbour a strong desire to follow in their paths.

And yes, He passed the SSC exams and honoured his promise. In 1996, on expressing his desire to join the priesthood, his Parish Priest guided him to enroll in the nearby SVD Seminary.

APPOINTMENT TO THE SACRED HEART PARISH

Fr. Ciril has served mainly in administrative roles since his ordination. At the Divine Call Centre in Mulki, he served in the music ministry and at Gyan Ashram, while himself learning, he also trained students in the field of Music and Dance.

Recognizing the need and his desire for a pastoral experience, he was appointed to Sacred Heart Parish in 2020. He joyfully accepted his appointment to Sacred Heart as an opportunity for his growth and maturity, having known the parish as a dynamic parish throughout the Archdiocese of Bombay.

EXPERIENCES IN OUR PARISH

Fr. Ciril remarks "An enriching one". His early period as Co-pastor here was marred by his inability to do much pastoral work due to the pandemic when there were many constraints. Yet, reaching out to our parishioners both here and abroad through online Eucharistic Celebrations and Adorations was a wonderful experience. Meetings on online platforms helped to identify and attend to the spiritual needs of the people.

Once the Churches opened up fully for worship, the exposure to the parishioners increased. Administering Sacraments and celebrating Masses aided his own spiritual, emotional, and personal development. It was a valuable learning experience listening to the joys and sorrows of the parishioners which he says transformed him to be more humane, social and practical.

CHALLENGES ARE A WAY OF LIFE

Working in a parish was different from his previous administrative experiences where the set-up was formal and firm. It necessitates being more people-friendly and sociable and this took time. Fr. Ciril feels that he has now developed these skills here. He has learned from the committed parishioners who love the clergy and devote their time and energy to the Church and its well-being to be more compassionate, caring, generous, and to devote his time to them.

He adds, "No one, however, is flawless. We will undoubtedly experience challenges since we cannot satisfy everyone. Sometimes goodwill towards someone can be misinterpreted as favouritism, and fraternal corrections can be misread. However, I always attempted to do what I felt was right in God's eyes."

MEMORABLE INCIDENT DURING THE PASTORAL MINISTRY

Fr. Ciril recounts one of the many heartwarming experiences: He was called to the Holy Spirit Hospital to anoint two patients since their Chaplain was out of the station. He anointed the first patient and prayed for her and she experienced healing. Waiting for the second patient he was told to come later as she was taken for an MRI. Meanwhile, he was called to bless one of the new wards. But by the time he returned to anoint the second patient, he was told that she had passed away. He was deeply moved. Deep in his heart, he felt that he should have anointed her before she could be taken for the test. He felt he had failed in his duty as a pastor. He prayed for her soul and accepted it as God's will.

DAILY MOTIVATION TO KEEP UP WITH THE ASSIGNMENT AT THE VIBRANT SACRED HEART PARISH

Fr. Ciril finds strength and motivation firstly in the meaningful daily celebration of the Holy Eucharist and in praying for the parishioners. This he admits has helped him both consciously and unconsciously to be a better person each day.

Secondly, he expresses, "Sacred Heart Parish can be compared to the heart which pumps blood 24 X 7 and keeps us alive and active. The Parish keeps us spiritually alive and active by engaging the parishioners in various activities, helping people to grow spiritually, emotionally and socially through better bonding with one another."

SUPPORT OF CLERGY TEAM MEMBERS

Fr. Ciril acknowledges the support of his Community members during the three years of pastoral ministry at Sacred Heart. He considers Fr. Innocent, Fr. Callisto, Fr. Sandesh and Fr. Rakesh as his pillars of support and growth, encouraging him to being a better pastor. Together they celebrated moments of joy and happiness and held on to each other during moments of challenge. Together they formed a great team and in their company he learnt to be more pastoral, people-oriented and sociable. Fr. Ciril is also grateful to Fr. Sunil Soreng SVD and Fr. Magimai Sundar SVD for their support and encouragement in their common endeavours.


SUMMING UP SACRED HEART PARISH IN THREE WORDS

Remember, the tree that bears the sweetest fruits is stoned. Just like Jesus, forgive, even those who harm you or malign your name. Encourage one another, support one another and pray for one another. Let us continue to work together for the building up of the kingdom of God.

Anointed to Serve



Many are called but a few are chosen. Whom God chooses He anoints and equips.

This is true of Fr. Ezekiel Rakesh D'souza SVD for God chose him to serve as His minister and he responded sincerely with a clear conscience. Fr. Rakesh whose priestly motto is 'Anointed to serve' joyfully engages and celebrates his everyday life as a priest. He cherishes his priestly life and finds fulfilment in his simple and humble way of serving others.

EARLY DAYS & VOCATION TO PRIESTHOOD

Fr. Rakesh hails from Our Lady of Loretto Parish, Bantwal, Mangalore and is the sixth among eight children in his family. He comes from an agricultural background. While in Grade VIII, Fr. Rakesh experienced a burning desire to join the priesthood and be of service to God and His people. Incidentally, it was at the same time that some priests of the Society of the Divine Word (SVD) congregation from Kirem Seminary came to his school to conduct a retreat. Young Rakesh who had already sensed God's call was taken up by their missionary zeal, life of prayer and dedication to preaching the Word of God. He found in Jesus the 'Precious Pearl' for whom he was now willing to leave everything behind. There were already two members of his immediate family who had joined the consecrated life; his elder brother Fr. Prakash D'souza, a priest in the Agra Diocese and his sister, Sr. Prescilla Prema, a religious nun in the Bethany Congregation. His maternal

aunt is also a religious Sister belonging to the Bethany congregation. Having witnessed firsthand, their selfless love for the Lord and their service to humanity further inspired Fr. Rakesh to join the Seminary. When he expressed this desire to his parents they were happy and supportive of his decision. With their blessings, he joined the SVD Seminary after completing High School to pursue a training period of 14 years for his priestly ministry.

APPOINTMENT TO THE SACRED HEART PARISH

Early on Fr. Rakesh was keen to serve the Lord in the poor especially those in rural and underprivileged areas. God, however, had other plans. Father was hesitant to accept his appointment at an urban Parish, viz. Sacred Heart Parish, Andheri East. He had his inhibitions as he believed that the parishioners in an urban area being advanced in their mindset may require a well-experienced priest. Yet, he accepted this appointment as God's will. Fr. Rakesh's ordination was delayed by over two months due to the constraints posed by the pandemic. Soon after his ordination on 14th July 2021, Fr. Rakesh joined our parish as a co-pastor.

EXPERIENCES IN OUR PARISH

Fr. Rakesh took up his appointment at our Parish on 19th July 2021 when there were restrictions to public movement due to the COVID-19 lockdown. Very soon, just after a week, he was asked to celebrate the Holy Eucharist online. He admits that he was very nervous initially however, he later overcame this phase by practice and also by accepting corrections from the members of the clergy team.

Fr. Rakesh has been involved as Spiritual Director in the various Cells and Associations of the Church, viz. Sunday school, Legion of Mary, Divine Mercy Cell, Altar Servers Group, Bible Cell, St. Paul's Guild and Women's Cell. Since all of this was a totally new experience for him, there were challenging times in the beginning. The Church activities however kept him busy and he was provided ample opportunity to learn new things such as the functioning of Cells, Associations and Communities. The personal interactions with families helped him to build confidence and face challenges boldly.

CHALLENGES WERE OPPORTUNITIES IN DISGUISE

The appointment at Sacred Heart Church was Fr. Rakesh's very first assignment after his ordination as a priest. His very first struggle was to celebrate Mass Online. The other challenges Fr. Rakesh faced initially were addressing large crowds and conducting meetings. The biggest challenge for him was to deal with the different temperaments of the people. There were times when it was difficult to cope due to the many activities in the Parish with so many Communities, Cells and Associations. Now Fr. Rakesh is confident in the midst of a large congregation and can freely interact with people, He can deal with the problems of the people. He has learnt how to conduct meetings and to understand both youth and children. Every Church activity has proved to be a great blessing for him.

MEMORABLE INCIDENT DURING THE PASTORAL MINISTRY

As part of his pastoral visits, Fr. Rakesh visited the sick, homebound and the elderly. About one such visit, Fr. Rakesh remarks that the caregiver son later mentioned to him that he observed positive changes in his nonagenarian mother and that she was calm after his visit. The idea that he could be a source of blessing to the elderly has deeply touched Fr. Rakesh.

DAILY MOTIVATION TO KEEP UP WITH THE ASSIGNMENT AT THE VIBRANT SACRED HEART PARISH

Fr. Rakesh begins his day by surrendering all the upcoming tasks of the day in prayer and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist which energises him.

The Clergy team, the PPC, the SCC and the Parishioners have been a pillar of support. He did not feel any burden as there were many individuals, who like angels, helped him to be strong and focused.

SUMMING UP SACRED HEART PARISH IN THREE WORDS

After almost one year of Pastoral ministry here, Fr. Rakesh sums up Sacred Heart Parish as Generous, Vibrant and Progressive.

SUPPORT OF CLERGY TEAM MEMBERS

The Clergy Team comprising Fr. Innocent, Fr. Ciril, Fr. Callisto, and Fr. Sandesh, were in Fr. Rakesh's opinion, his greatest blessing. They were understanding and supportive towards one another and functioned together as one unit. There was great teamwork as they prayed together, ate meals together, discussed individual programs and planned them all out together.

Feast of the Divine Mercy



On April 30, 2000, before a gathering of over two hundred and fifty thousand pilgrims and a host of television cameras, Pope John Paul II canonized Saint Faustina Kowalska, 'the great Apostle of Divine Mercy'. In doing so, he also approved the Divine Mercy message and devotion by declaring the second Sunday of Easter as "Divine Mercy Sunday".

This year, the Universal Church celebrated Divine Mercy Sunday on April 16th. We in our Parish heralded the Feast with a 9-day Novena beginning on Good Friday and a Triduum preached from April 12th to 14th during the 7:00 pm Mass. Day 1 of the Triduum, preached by Fr. John Singarayar SVD, concentrated on **Divine Mercy Sunday: What is this Feast all about;** on day 2, Fr. Scaria Pannackal SVD spoke on the **Role and Life of St. Faustina – Apostle** of Divine Mercy and on day 3, Fr. Cranston Vaz SVD focussed on **the ABC of Divine Mercy.**

The Feast Mass was celebrated at 10:00 am with a solemn Eucharistic procession of the Divine Mercy Cell members, the Lectors, the Cross Bearers, the Altar Servers and the Clergy. The main celebrant Fr. Innocent Fernandes SVD, in his inspiring homily, shared the story of a little boy who came home very happy from his Catechism class and told his mother that he was happy because God shares in his weakness. "God is also poor in Mathematics, just like me. The teacher taught us the story of God who left 99 sheep in the wilderness and went in search of the one sheep that was lost". Hearing this, his mother explained, that it is this weakness of the Lord that is our greatest refuge and hope and it is called Mercy. Continuing his homily, Fr. Innocent brought to focus, that today as we celebrate the Feast of the Divine Mercy of Jesus, we are reminded of His deep love for us

through His Passion, Death and Resurrection, celebrating His immense compassion and unconditional love for humankind. Jesus came into the world to *"save and seek the lost"*. He invited the lay faithful to:

- Re-consecrate to the Mercy of the Lord.
- Re-commit to showing mercy and compassion to all.

In conclusion, Fr. Innocent reiterated that the Mercy of God is indeed the story of willingness, devoid of mathematical calculations – extending, without discrimination, His love to all. The weakness of our Lord is His Mercy and His Mercy is our greatest refuge and hope.

The frame with the picture of the Divine Mercy set against a backdrop of red and white - the colours of the Divine Mercy, within an arch of fresh red and white flowers lent solemnity to the occasion. Later, the members of the Divine Mercy Cell gathered in the Community hall for an afternoon of fun and fellowship.

Calvary Through The Eyes of Mary

As a kid, my mother would always take me to St. Michael's Church on Wednesdays for the Novena of Our Lady of Perpetual Succor. I remember sitting in the first half of the Church, surprised to see so many devotees coming there to pray. Back then, my first understanding of Mother Mary was that if I prayed to her, she would listen to me. Later, as a Legionary, our President always reminded us that we were 'the army of our Mother'. I understood that besides being a great intercessor, Mary was also a strong woman and a true leader.

But when I watched the movie 'The Passion of the Christ' for the first time, I saw Mary witness her Son being tortured, humiliated and betrayed by his own people and then the question came to my mind: Why did she stand there still, seeing her Son go through all this?

My younger self would never have thought that I would get this answer through the 'Way of the Cross' enactment when I played the role of 'Mary' on Good Friday this year. This year we had more than 40 youth from different Communities participating along with the children from Sunday School. The narrative for the Way of the Cross was through the eyes of Mary and John.

We began our month-long practices under the guidance of our Youth Animators who planned to make this event not merely an enactment, but also a meaningful experience for everyone.

After the auditions, when I was selected to play the role of Mary, I was both excited and nervous and wondered if I could do justice to the role. Looking at the way each one had immersed themselves into their respective roles, especially those playing the role of Jesus and the soldiers, I got more insight as to the level at which I should prepare myself. To play the role of a woman who stood strong in the face of adversity, expressed emotions through her eyes in silence and had to bear the loss of her Son in such tragic circumstances; to feel those emotions and to express them was the main challenge before me. I watched a couple of videos to prepare myself. At the fourth station, where Jesus meets His mother and she embraces Him like she did when He would fall as a child, reminded me of familiar moments when our own mothers have reassured us in our vulnerable situations. I had to recall those moments and tap into those emotions and let myself flow into the role.

I had an amazing experience during this one month of preparation leading to the live Stations of the Cross on Good Friday.

Coming back to the present day, that young girl with that question in her mind has got her answer. My understanding of Mary as a mother in the life of Jesus grew.

Mary chose to walk down that road 'Out of her Love for you and me.'

Screen Time and Children

Screens like tablets, smart phones, laptops and televisions have become an integral part of our daily lives and children these days have access to devices more than ever before. Several children these days spend hours on end looking at screens. Screen addiction can prove hazardous to young minds, not only does it limit their imagination but also stifles their creativity and prevents them from getting enough physical activity.

Problems associated with excessive screen time in children:

1. Behavioural and Psychological issues

Excessive screen time has shown to increase aggressive behaviour in children, mood problems and frustration. Children also fail to develop healthy social skills and display decreased attention and concentration thus resulting in poor academic outcomes. More than 90 minutes of screen time per day in children under 3 years has been associated with hyperactive behaviours.

2. Weight gain issues

Children who spend more time looking at screens tend to spend much less time playing outdoor games and show lesser participation in physical activities. This causes childhood obesity and unhealthy weight gain.

3. Eating while watching Television

Watching TV while eating results in distraction feeding, hurried eating, poor chewing or overeating. It hampers overall nutrition and prevents children from developing a positive relationship with food.

4. Sleeping Trouble

Too much screen time prior to bedtime results in poor quality of sleep or insomnia in children.



5. Bad Posture

Watching mobiles or television in awkward postures for a long time can cause a lot of strain on the neck, spine and other joints.

6. Eye Problems

Prolonged exposure to screens can cause eye discomfort, eye fatigue, dry eyes, nearsightedness, eye pain and frequent headaches.

Tips for reducing screen time:

1. Avoid watching television while eating

Encourage kids to eat their meals together with the family. Meal time should be screenfree as a rule.

2. Raise Readers

Reading to and with children from an early age helps them to start reading independently. Reading books helps increase concentration and focus in kids and improves their creativity and memory. Apart from increasing their vocabulary and comprehension skills, it also helps reduce stress and promotes social and emotional development.

3. Set limits around screen time

No screen time one hour before bedtime. No more than one hour of screen time per day for children between 2 and 5 years old and no more than 2 hours daily for kids above 5 years.

4. Role models

Children closely observe their parent's behaviours and mimic them. Hence in order to reduce the screen time of kids, parents too should limit their own screen time at home.

5. Encourage other activities

Involve children in household chores like washing fruits, vegetables, setting up the dinner table, folding clothes and cleaning their study desks. Encourage them to try and learn new hobbies like music, skating, chess, dancing and painting. Interesting hobbies can positively help divert their attention away from gadgets.

Inspiration from Saints

St. Josephine Bakhita

Feast Day: February 8

Patron: Modern Sudan and Human Trafficking survivors.

St. Josephine Margaret Bakhita was born in 1869 in Darfur, Western Sudan. Her lovely family consisted of three brothers and three sisters; the other four siblings had passed away before her birth. Her father was a respected and moderately successful village chief's brother from the Daju tribe. As she put it, her early life was "a very happy and carefree life, without knowing what suffering was".

She was abducted by Arab slave traders when she was just 7 years old. She was unable to recall her name because of the fear and trauma and her kidnappers mocked her by nicknaming her "Bakhita," which in Arabic means "fortunate".

During the 12 years of her captivity, she was tortured by her various owners. She frequently suffered brandings and beatings. Her first owner, a wealthy Arab, gave her as a maid to his daughters. Angered, perhaps for smashing a vase, she received such harsh punishment that it rendered her unable to move for a month.

Another of her owners was a Turkish general, he gave her to his wife and mother-in-law who both beat her daily. Once the general's wife ordered her to be scarred. As her mistress watched, ready with a whip, another woman drew patterns on her skin with flour, then cut into her flesh with a blade. She rubbed the wounds with salt to make the scars permanent. She suffered a total of 114 scars from this abuse.

During these early years of her life, she did not know Christ but she did believe in a Creator and had great awe and wonder for His creation.

Eventually, after exchanging several hands,

Bakhita was redeemed at Khartoum in 1883 by Italian Vice Consul, Callisto Legani and was brought to Venice. He was a much kinder master and he did not beat her.

Later she was given away to another family as a gift. Here she served as a caretaker for a young girl at a school in Venice run by Canossian Sisters. Her mistress left Bakhita in the care of the Canossian Sisters when she decided to travel to Sudan without her.

Bakhita was very intrigued by the Catholic faith. She learned many things from the sisters and was eventually baptized.

Against the will of her owner, who wanted to take her back to Africa, she went before the Italian courts seeking her freedom. The courts declared that Bakhita was a free woman because by then, slavery had been outlawed both in Italy and Sudan and they allowed her to stay in Italy. For the first time in her life, Bakhita was free and could choose what to do with her life. She chose to remain with the Canossian Sisters.

She was baptized on January 9, 1890, and took the name Josephine Margaret Fortunata. (Fortunata - Latin for her Arabic name, Bakhita). She also received First Holy Communion and Confirmation on the same day. Giuseppe Sarto, the Cardinal Patriarch of Venice and the future Pope Pius X, administered the sacraments to her.

After the terrifying "masters" who had till then despised and maltreated her, or at best considered her a useful slave, Bakhita came to know a totally different kind of "master" whom she called "paron" meaning master in

the Venetian dialect she was now learning for the Living God, the God of Jesus Christ. One who knew her had created her-the one who actually loved her. The supreme "Paron" before whom all other masters are themselves no more than lowly servants.

Bakhita was attracted to the religious life and entered the Canossian Sisters where she remained for about forty-five years. She lived out the rest of her days serving God and her community and teaching others to love Him with great faithfulness. She worked as a cook and a doorkeeper at the convent. She also traveled and visited other convents telling her story to other sisters and preparing them for work in Africa.

She was known for her gentle voice and smile and was often referred to lovingly as the "Little Brown Sister" or honourably as the "Black Mother."

During World War II, the people of the village of Schio regarded her as their protector and although bombs fell on their village, not one citizen died.

In her later years, she began to suffer physical pain and was forced to use a wheelchair. But she always remained cheerful. If anyone asked her how she was, she would reply, "As the master desires." When speaking of her enslavement, she said "If I were to meet the slave traders who kidnapped me and even those who tortured me, I would kneel and kiss their hands, for if that did not happen, I would not be a Christian and Religious today."

On the evening of February 8, 1947, Josephine uttered her final words, "Our Lady, Our Lady!" She then died. She was canonized on October 1, 2000, by Pope John Paul II.
