From The Pastor's Desk

When Life Caves in

He raises up the poor from the dust; He lifts the needy from the ash heap to make them sit with princes and inherit a seat of honor. (1 Samuel 2:8)

My Beloved Parishioners,

Lent is the call for the faithful to reflect upon one's life and the accompaniment of God's grace in times of crisis and storms of life. Our present-day world is encountering stormy weather with uprisings, wars, ethnic cleansing, disputes, illegal migrants, brain-drain, and rising unemployment leading to split families, divorces, extra-marital affairs and poverty. At such a time we are called to embrace the Cross willingly and follow Him with Prayer, Fasting and Almsgiving, hoping in the Risen Lord and becoming a beacon of hope to our wounded world.

Let us Gaze at the Cross and Wait in Prayer. Let us slow down, pause, stop and listen meditatively and contemplatively to the Divine Voice prompting us, during the Holy Week and seek the face of the Suffering Christ in our families, communities, and neighborhood.

One way God gives "New strength" is by **SWOOPING INTO OUR SITUATIONS**, grabbing and lifting us out of it. God intervenes supernaturally and as you keep praising Him, **HE COMES, AS IF FROM NOWHERE** and swoops you out of your difficult situation as on eagle's wings.

Is there anybody whose life has caved in? Psalm 42:31 tells us, 'Those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength.' When my Life caves in, is it hidden from the Lord? When I cry out, 'JUSTICE, FAIRNESS,.... THIS IS NOT FAIR....What happened is not fair...what I am going through is not fair', God says what I want you to do is to wait on Me in total surrender.

One of the meanings of the word **"WAIT"** in Hebrew is **'to plait'**. When one plaits the hair, the hair is intertwined, wrapped and tightened so they are not subjected to the blowing wind. **Waiting in the Lord** calls us to **PLAIT OUR LIVES in the Lord**. We may have messed up our lives and things may be worsening day by day. Let us plait our circumstances, our decisions, and our goals and intertwine them with the Lord. Let us wrap and tie ourselves completely with the Lord in prayer, at all times and not be

disconnected from Him. That would mean "Not going outside of God to fix the situation." because when crisis knocks one down, the temptation is to assume that God does not care and look to other options rather than for God.

Scripture has many instances of people who learned to wait for God's intervention. Abraham and Sarah waited for an offspring, Noah waited for the rain, Hannah waited for the blessing of a child, Ruth waited for Obed - her husband, David waited to build the temple, Solomon waited in prayer for wisdom, Daniel waited in prayer for being rescued from the ferocious lions, Joaquim and Anna waited for the birth of Mary, Zechariah and Elizabeth waited for the birth of John the Baptist,

Mary and Joseph waited for the birth of God's Son "IMMANUEL", the Apostles' waited in prayer for the coming of the Holy Spirit. All these wonderful things happened because they were **CONNECTED**, they had plaited themselves in GOD.

How can you know that you are connected with God? It is when you realize that you have begun to **WORSHIP God** and have stopped **COMPLAINING**.

Psalm 130:5 says, "I wait for the Lord... and in His Word, I hope". When situations grow worse, read Isaiah 40 and Psalm 42.

Lamentation 3: 25, 26 speaks of how good it is to wait for God. It is a good practice to plait or tie ourselves with God, even before any crisis, for crisis should not be the reason for connecting with God. When one is in crisis, strength drains away from within

God says if you wait on me, I will give you a New Strength. Just like a battery is charged by connecting to the electricity, we receive new strength.

They shall mount up with wings like an eagle. (Isaiah 40:31)

God gives new strength firstly **Through His Divine intervention**.

An eagle pushes the eaglet from the nest so that it learns to fly, but when it cannot fly and falls down, the eagle comes along with its wide-open wings and **SWOOPS** the baby eagle on its back. Likewise, God gives new strength **by swooping down** and wrapping Himself around us during our crises. It is God who supernaturally intervenes and rescues us in our messedup situations. GOD is good all the time, and all the time God is good.

Secondly, 'They shall run and not be tired'.

Here, God does not swoop down and rescue but rather, He allows one to go through the process of running, but God gives the ability to run. He says 'You go run and I will give you a new energy so that you can do it, achieve it. For example, when you are on a treadmill, if you simultaneously watch television, you don't usually get tired. Focusing on TV makes you run better. Similarly, if you focus on God, you will run well, face the situation and handle the crises of life with more enthusiasm.

Thirdly, 'They shall walk and not faint'.

Here, you can no longer run but you are walking. When you are on a treadmill you do not jump off while running, but gradually slow down the speed and pace. Sometimes life gets hard and you can't run. That becomes Divine Encouragement. When God does not change the situation, He changes you inspite of the problem. You may hear a song or listen to a sermon or watch a movie, that relates to your life situation, encouraging you to change your way of living. In the end, nothing changes, except you. God puts us in a situation where He does not intend any change.

In all three ways, He has given new strength. Finally, He says, 'I AM WITH YOU ALWAYS'. You are not alone, He is there

present in the situations, in the crises of our lives. He needs us to just Wait on HIM in Prayer.

Easter reminds us of God's infinite Love by transforming our daily fear, crises and tragedies into the ultimate victory through the cross.

We are an Easter people and Alleluia is our song.

Together with my Co-Pastors Fr. Edwin, Fr. Callisto, Fr. Sandesh and Fr. Christi, I wish all our parishioners, A BLESSED EASTER AND NEWNESS OF LIFE.

May the Risen Lord become even more alive in each of you personally and in your Community and Parish lives.

He is Risen! Do not be afraid.

One of the hidden but strongest longings of the human heart is that we should live forever. But the reality of human existence is that one day it will all end. God has created us with a purpose. Whether we want it or not, one day we will die! The question that confronts us is this: Is life worth living if it will all end? There is hope for those who believe in Jesus and His resurrection. The resurrection is not only His triumph but a promise that we too will, like Him, rise again. We have the promise of the Father and the Risen Jesus is our guarantee. He has risen and so shall we!

Jesus gives us hope. **Christian hope** is different from optimism, different from merely having a positive attitude. Henri Nouven, a Dutch Catholic priest, professor, writer and theologian says, "Christian hope is built upon the promise that whatever happens, God will stay with us at all times, in all places."

Fr. Elias Dias SDB, in his book, "Divine Stories for Families" narrates an incident in the life of Michael Faraday - a famous scientist. One day when his servant came into his drawing room with a silver vessel, he accidentally dropped it on the ground and it broke into several pieces. Michael collected all the pieces of the vessel and put them into a chemical solution which precipitated the silver and made one mass of it. He then shaped the same silver mass into a beautiful cup. This new creation was much more beautiful than the earlier one. It was the same silver that appeared in a different form. The Resurrection of Christ tells us that our earthly bodies will be transformed into a new life.

God does not give up on anything; much less on anyone. In the lion's den, in the fish's belly, in the fiery furnace, in a borrowed tomb, in our lives ... it may seem like it is all over, but God is not finished yet.

God has a plan for everything. It is hard for us to believe that whatever happens in our lives is because God desires it to happen to us for our own good and growth. How hard it is for us to understand, and harder still to accept, that all the pain and suffering, abandonment and rejection, grief and even death, happens in our lives because God so desires it. God so desires it not to make us weak and sad; not to make us negative and sorrowful. But on the contrary to make us strong and joyful; positive and life-affirming people.

Jesus rose as a sign to those who loved Him and followed Him that God's Divine Love is stronger than death. God is the God of life who never fails. The same God who raised Jesus will help us arise from whatever is keeping us down. Because Jesus rose again, we too will rise!

(CCO) along with the Clergy Team organised the celebration of All Association Day on 21st January 2024 as a token of gratitude to the members of the various Cells and Associations, the PPC, the SCC Coordinators and the Animators who render selfless service to our Parish. The Holy Eucharist was celebrated at 5.30 p.m. in the Church followed by a get-together on the Parish grounds. The fun-filled evening was very much appreciated and well attended. It was indeed a very entertaining and memorable evening.

The Parish Association Council (PAC) meeting was held on 29th January, 2024. It was well attended by the representatives of the Parish Cells and Associations. The forthcoming events were announced. Suggestions were garnered for the improvement of the working of Cells\ Associations.

St. Vincent de Paul Association (S.V.P.) renders help to the needy, not only of our Parish but also the people belonging to other faiths.

In November, 12 members of the S.V.P. visited Home for the Aged, Shanti Bhavan, Kalyan and interacted with the housemates through games. The SVP donated food items and toiletries.

The SVP arranged breakfast for HIV patients at Serva Seva Sangh and distributed 40 hampers on the occasion of World Day of the Poor on 19th November 2023 at the Gyan Ashram Campus. In December, Christmas hampers were given to 24 adopted families. Chicken to 37 families, Cakes to 40 families and Cash assistance to 22 Catholic families.

Every month cash assistance is given to 8 families, Ration aid to 30 families in addition to educational and medical aid to families.

The Senior Citizen Cell organized a Christmas party on 2nd December for all senior citizens of our Parish at 4.30 p.m. in the Community Centre.

Picnic was arranged for the Seniors of our Parish to Bosco wadi, Uttan on 27th January, 2024

designed their respective Community Flag and these flags of the 36 SCC communities of our parish were displayed on the Church campus on the Parish Day. Area-wise Rosary was conducted on Saturdays in the Church. During Christmas season the Christmas stars prepared by each Community of the Parish adorned the Church compound.

The Inter-Religious Dialogue Cell organized the Flag hoisting Ceremony on Republic Day after the 7.30 a.m. Mass. Parishioners attended in large numbers.

The Hope and Life Movement organised visits to the elderly and the sick. Christmas party was held on 23rd December. There were games and prizes were distributed to each member.

Orientation Program - IRDC

The Inter-Religious Dialogue Cell of our Parish organised an Orientation program on Inter-Religious Dialogue, on 14th January 2024, in the mini hall of the Church at 6.45 p.m. Fr. (Dr) SM Michael, SVD, Professor of Cultural Anthropology with a doctorate in Sociology, and the current Secretary of the Archdiocesan Commission of IRDC was the resource person for the event. The event started with a solemn prayer by our Parish Priest Fr. John Mascarenhas, SVD.

Andrew Dsouza of IRDC welcomed the speaker and the audience. Fr. Michael explained the meaning, role and importance of inter-religious dialogue in the current socio-political situation in India. He stressed that without inter-religious harmony, freedom of religion is almost impossible to achieve in our country. The important elements of acceptance, understanding, co-operation, as well as rights and justice are important to strengthen inter-religious relations and build a harmonious co-existence among the varied religious groups. The goal of inter-faith dialogue is not unity in faith and worship but mutual understanding, respect, and mutual enrichment. It includes collaboration wherever possible in response to the socioeconomic problems we all commonly face.

Fr. Michael explained that the citizens of India have the freedom of choice to accept any religion and promulgate their own faith under the Indian Constitution. It is necessary to accord dignity and respect to people of other faiths as well. We have to practice dialogue by greeting and showing solidarity with the traditions and cultures of the people of other faiths and religions. Our dialogue must be action-oriented. Then, after getting confidence and trust, we can share our stories and listen to their faith experiences. In our Archdiocese there are 130 parishes with Inter-Religious Dialogue Cells to establish rapport with people of other faiths. The question-and-answer session offered an opportunity for the audience to seek clarification on general practices, including attending festivals of other faiths and accepting offerings made to their gods. Fr. Michael, along with Fr. John, addressed the queries with appropriate answers, citing biblical references.

Tea and snacks were distributed to all. About 50 people including the Canossian sisters, novices and parishioners attended the program. Parent's and Grandparent's Day (23rd July)

• All Saints Day (29th October)

HEALTH SPACE

Low Back Pain



Low back pain is a very common issue, prevalent largely among the younger generation as an occupational hazard and poor lifestyle choices and is no longer restricted to the elderly.

Understanding the root cause of one's back pain will enable one to avoid it and work towards rectifying it.

The most common reason is adopting poor posture for prolonged periods daily. This causes the muscles and ligaments around the back to get overstretched, weak, and eventually lose their ability to support the back optimally. It also causes premature ageing of the joints.

Of course, there are other reasons as well such as Osteoporosis, Osteoarthritis, Disc bulge, underlying diseases such as cancer, TB, etc., trauma / fracture due to accidents, stressrelated or due to pregnancy

Low back pain due to poor posture is very common and ironically has the simplest solution. Unfortunately, people tend to ignore the early signs and symptoms and wait till they are in unbearable pain. Imagine bending your finger backward for a few seconds. You will feel a stretch, and after some time it will hurt, however, once you release the finger, the pain disappears. But as the finger is bent for a longer time, the pain increases and ultimately the muscle will get overstretched, losing its elasticity and strength and there will be constant pain.

This is what happens to our lower back too. Its natural and neutral position is called 'lordosis'. When we excessively bend forward i.e. slouch while sitting or standing for prolonged hours, the ligaments and muscles go through tremendous strain daily thereby overstretching and weakening them, causing excessive pain. If this is not rectified, it could lead to further worsening as a prolapsed disc or "slipped disc", nerve compression, etc.`

Maintaining a good posture is easier said than done since it requires a 100% conscious effort and is not involuntary. One needs to actively maintain the right posture at all times. This does not in any way dismiss other underlying issues which might further contribute to low back pain such as abnormal bony structures, age-related wear and tear, diseases, etc. However, what is important to understand is that no amount of medication or supplements can replace self-correction in the form of appropriate exercises that will strengthen weak, overstretched muscles and thereby help to maintain a good posture.

In ancient times before the divine sojourn of the Savior took place, even to the saints death was terrible; all wept for the dead as though they perished. But now that the Savior has raised His body, death is no longer terrible; for all who believe in Christ trample on it as it were nothing and choose rather to die than deny their faith in Christ. And that devil that once maliciously exulted in death, now that its pains were loosed, remained the only one truly dead.

Humans are not meant to be immobile. Our bodies thrive on being active. Inactivity leads to muscle loss/ wastage, weak bones, and a volley of problems thereafter.

Low back pain does not happen suddenly! It is a long and slow process when we subject our back to abnormal postures while sitting or standing over a prolonged period. Hence good postural habits go a long way right up till old age.

Here is a list of DON'TS and DO'S for a healthy lower back.

1. Do not slouch forward while working at the desk.

- Try placing a lumbar roll or pillow between the chair and low back to provide the right support. Adjust the distance between your desk and chair such that you maintain an erect posture at all times.
- Change/Break your pattern of staying in the same position for more than 40 mins. Get up, take a small 1 min stroll, or stand at your desk and bend your back backward and rotate it a few times. Practice this all through the day. Sitting continuously for 8 - 10 hours is very harmful to your back health.

2. Avoid Jerky, sudden movements especially while pulling/pushing/ lifting something heavy.

- While pushing /pulling or lifting a heavy object, ensure you adopt a wide stance, the weight must be equally distributed through both your hands. Do not attempt a one-sided pull.
- If the object is at a low height, you should squat and move the object.

3. Do not excessively bend forward from the low back to pick up objects from the floor.

- Always squat and pick up objects from the floor no matter how light they are.
- 4. Do not slouch "to relax" after a session of intense workout / or any intense sports activity.

- Either sit straight with support or let your back fall backward.
- 5. Do not lift abnormally heavy weights at the gym under peer pressure.
- Understand your goals & limitations based on your existing strength and choose weights wisely. Slow and steady is the best way to go.

Additionally:

• Check your Vitamin D and Calcium levels which is crucial for your bone health.

Once you have started taking supplements for the same, make it a point to check its level every 2 years to ensure maintenance.

 Indulge in some kind of physical activity for at least 30 minutes daily.
eg: walking, jogging, yoga, swimming, cycling, light aerobic exercises, etc

ST. POPE JOHN PAUL II

Feast Day: 22nd October

Patron Saint of Youth, Families and World Youth Day

Karol Józef Wojtyła was born on May 18, 1920, in Wadowice, Poland, the youngest of three children born to Karol Wojtyła and Emilia Kaczorowska. He was known to his friends as 'Lolek'. His sister, Olga died soon after birth and when Karol was eight, his mother died. Three years later, his brother Edmund, a football player, a talented student and a physician died at the age of 26, while treating patients during an epidemic.

Karol grew up under the loving guidance of his father and was a vibrant youth- athletic, studious and a gifted theatrical performer. Karol Sr. taught his son to pray, trust in God, be devoted to the Blessed Virgin and love his Polish culture.

After high school, Karol enrolled in the Jagiellonian University of Krakow in 1938. When the occupying Nazi forces closed the University in 1939, Karol worked in a quarry and then in a chemical factory to earn a living and to avoid deportation to Germany. In February 1941, Karol returned from work one day to discover that his father had died alone. He prayed by the body all night.

By the autumn of 1942, he had decided to enter the priesthood. It was during this time that he met his spiritual mentor, Jan Tyranowski, and was introduced to the Carmelite mysticism of St. John of the Cross.

He studied at an underground seminary in Kraków during World War II and was ordained in 1946. In 1948, he earned a doctorate in philosophy in Rome and returned home to serve in a parish, earning a second doctorate in sacred theology, from the Jagiellonian University. He became Archbishop of Kraków in 1964 and Cardinal in 1967.

Cardinal Wojtyła was elected Pope on October 16, 1978, and took the name John Paul II. He was the 263rd successor to Saint Peter and was to have one of the longest pontificates in the history of the Church, lasting nearly 27 years. He retained his Episcopal motto, "Totus Tuus – I am completely yours." Immediately, John Paul Il went out to the entire world with a vigorous missionary spirit. He travelled widely, using the eight languages he spoke- Polish, Italian, French, German, English, Spanish, Portuguese and Latin and his well-known personal charm, to connect with the Catholic faithful, as well as many outside the fold. His international apostolic journeys numbered 104 to 129 different countries.

His love for young people led him to establish World Youth Day, in 1985.

The Pope's concern for marriage and the family was clearly expressed in the establishment of the World Meeting of Families, his Wednesday catechesis on human love and the founding of the Pontifical John Paul II Institute for Studies on Marriage and Family.



His nonviolent activism spurred movements that contributed to the gradual and peaceful removal of Communism from Eastern Europe.

On May 3, 1981, in St. Peter's Square, Pope John Paul II was shot and wounded by Mehmet Ali Agca. The Pope credited our Lady of Fatima with saving his life and exhibited extraordinary love and forgiveness by visiting his attacker, in prison.

No other Pope met as many people as Pope John Paul II. More than 17.6 million pilgrims attended his Wednesday General Audiences Pope John Paul II's doctrinal legacy is one of the richest in the history of the Church. He tirelessly guarded the deposit of faith and the tradition of the Church from errors, promoting authentic theological, moral and spiritual doctrine.

He was also a prolific writer; His writings included 14 encyclicals, 15 apostolic exhortations, 11 apostolic constitutions and 45 apostolic letters in addition to the catechesis delivered in the general audiences, lectures and homilies given during his many travels.

Pope John Paul II beatified 1,338 people and canonized 482 saints.

Pope John Paul II successfully encouraged dialogue with the Jews and inaugurated a time of healing between Jews, Muslims and representatives of other religions.

Pope John Paul II's papacy was marked by his firm and unwavering opposition to communism and war, abortion, contraception, capital punishment, homosexual sex, euthanasia, human cloning and stem cell research.

He proclaimed the Year of Redemption, the Marian Year and the Year of the Eucharist as well as the Great Jubilee Year of 2000, in order to provide the people of God with particularly intense spiritual experiences.

Suffering from the debilitating effects of Parkinson's disease, the aftereffects of the wounds from the attempted assassination, multiple surgeries, and the loss of his voice, Pope John Paul II expressed in his last days the mystery of the Crucified Lord.

Pope John Paul II died in the Apostolic Palace on April 2, 2005, the vigil of Divine Mercy Sunday, which he had instituted.

On May 1, 2011, Pope Benedict XVI beatified Pope John Paul II, and Pope Francis canonized Saint John Paul II alongside Saint John XXIII on April 27, 2014.
